If an incident or a near miss occurs, all work must stop an attactive Depending on the severity of the incident, a meeting will be called with all workers to amend the SWMS if required. The meeting may also be an educational opportunity.			
Any changes made to the SWMS after an incident or a near miss must be approved by the Person Conducting Business or Undertaking and communicated to all relevant personnel.			
The SWMS must be kept and be available for inspection at least until the work is completed. Where a SWMS is revised, all versions should be kept. If a notifiable incident occurs in relation to which the SWMS relates, then the SWMS must be kept for at least two years from the occurrence of the notifiable incident.

Ensure all team members are wearing appropriate PE, including high-visibility vests, steel-capped boots, gloves, helmets, and eve protection when occessary. Provide training on proper menual handling technicles to revent strains and injuries from lifting heavy objects. Use signage or obarriers occord off the area and alert other workers and passersby of the work zone to minimise utrip, and fairlies. Implement a holdy system' where workers assist each other in navigating difficult terrain or obstacles safely. Keep the stocks first aid kit readily accessible for immediate response to any minor injuries that may occur. Maintan clear mmunication among team members using radios or mobile phones to coordinate alerts a left others promptly if an emergency arises. Inspee rules and equipment regularly to ensure they are in good working condition and do not pose any childrional mazards. Nor nor storeaks to ensure workers remain alert and vigilant throughout the duration of the task. Utilise mechanical aids such as trolleys, winches, or dollies to handle heavy loads more safely and efficiently. Ensure adequate lighting is available, especially during night-time operations, to reduce the likelihood of accidents due to poor visibility. Develop an emergency response plan that includes procedures for calling for help, evacuation routes, and incident reporting. Verify that all vehicles used for towing are properly maintained and equipped with safety features like functional brakes and lights. Remind workers to be aware of their surroundings at all times, particularly when transitioning between different surface types such as gravel, asphalt, or grass. 	2M

When the SWMS has been revised the PCBU must ensure that persons involved with the work are advised that a revision has been made and how they can acces he revised SWMS, including all persons who will need to change a work procedure or system as a region of the review are advised of the changes in a way that will enable them to implement their duties antly with the revised SWMS. All workers that will be involved in the work must be provided with the relevant information and instruction that will assist them to understand and implement the revised SWMS.

The SWMS must be monitored regularly for the effectiveness of ensuring hazard controls are effective in reducing the risk of incidents, keeping the workplace safe for all personnel. The person responsible for monitoring the effectiveness of the Safe Work Method Statement should employ a multi-faceted approach which includes but is not limited to:

- 1. Spot Checks.
- 2. Consultation with workers, contractors and sub-contractors.
- 3. Internal audits on a continual basis.

An approach of continuous improvement, promptly recording inconsistencies or deficiencies. followed up by immediate corrective action and consultation with all relevant personnel ensures that the PCBU is consistently developing ever-improving systems of safe work principles.
