The SWMS must be kept and be available for inspection at least until the work is completed. Where a SWMS is revised, all versions should be kept. If a notifiable incident occurs in relation to which the SWMS relates, then the SWMS must be kept for at least two years from the occurrence of the notifiable incident.

Regularly schedule refresher training sessions to update workers on new techniques, equipment changes, and best practices regarding vibration analysis. Implement a buddy system where less experienced operators conduct the analysis under the supervision of seasoned personnel. Ensure personal protective equipment (PPE) such as gloves and hearing protection is provided and worn properly when handling or near operational equipment. Maintain a logbook of equipment use and maintenance activities to track performance issues and schedule timely servicing.	1L

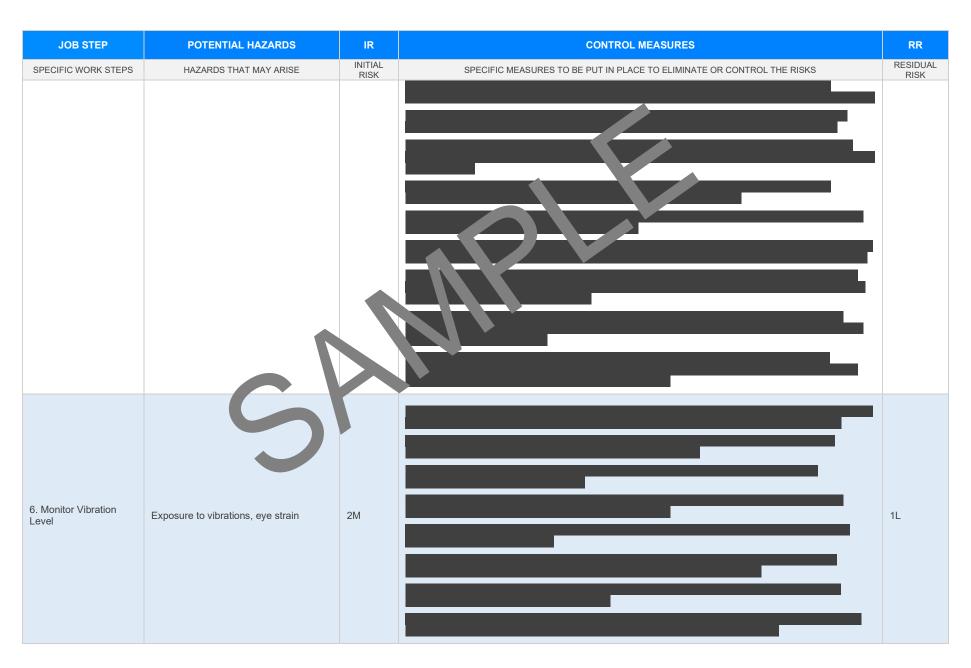

			- Monitor and document noise and vibration levels consistently during the task to assess the effectiveness of control measures and make adjustments if necessary.

SAFE WORK IN THE STATEMENT MONITORING AND REVIEW

The SWMS must be reviewed regularly to make sure it remains a fective of must be reviewed (and revised if necessary) if relevant control measures are revised. The view process should be carried out in consultation with workers (including contractors of the SWMS and their health and safety representatives who represented that work group at the workplace.

When the SWMS has been revised the PCBU mast ensure that advised that a revision has been made and how they can access the revised SWMS, including all persons who will need to change a work procedure or system as a rest of the review are advised of the changes in a way that will enable them to implement their duties and the involved in the work must be provided with the relevant information and instruction that will assist them to understand and implement the revised SWMS.

The SWMS must be monitored regularly for the effectiveness of ensuring hazard controls are effective in reducing the risk of incidents, keeping the workplace safe for all personnel.
