Any changes made to the SWMS after an incident or a near miss must be approved by the Person Conducting Business or Undertaking and communicated to all relevant personnel.			
The SWMS must be kept and be available for inspection at least until the work is completed. Where a SWMS is revised, all versions should be kept. If a notifiable incident occurs in relation to which the SWMS relates, then the SWMS must be kept for at least two years from the occurrence of the notifiable incident.

Implement dust suppression techniques such as well or down surfaces to minimise airborne particulates. Ensure adequate ventilation in the work area, using exhaustors to remove dust particles from the air. Provide personal protective exponent (PPE) included or N95 respirators for all workers involved in the process. Set up barrid or enclosurs around the work real to confine dust and prevent it from spreading to adjacent area. Use a shanical side we vacuums equipped with HEPA filters for cleaning instead of dry sweeping. Allog expignate walkways to keep pathways clear and minimise tripping hazards from equipment left lying all unu. Clearly nark and secure cables or hoses that cross pedestrian pathways to eliminate trip risks. A sular inspect and maintain all dust control equipment to ensure its effectiveness and proper function. Train all workers on the importance of maintaining cleanliness and order in the workplace to reduce as a lent risks. Schedule routine checks to monitor air quality levels and take corrective actions if respirable dust concentrations exceed OHS guidelines. 	2M

Ensure all ventilation systems are operational and have been serviced according to manufacturer's specifications. Install local exhaust ventilation systems near the source of respirable particles to effectively capture contaminants. Use appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) such as N95 masks or P2 respirators in areas where adequate ventilation is not possible. Replace filters in ventilation systems regularly based on manufacturer's guidelines and workplace conditions. Schedule regular maintenance checks for all machinery to prevent unexpected failures that may release respirable particles. Train workers on proper use and limitations of respiratory protection equipment. Implement a tagging system to swiftly identify and report damaged or malfunctioning equipment. Ensure that ventilation ducts are clear of obstructions and not blocked by stored materials. 	1L

SAFE WORK IN THE STATEMENT MONITORING AND REVIEW

The SWMS must be reviewed regularly to make sure it remains a fective of must be reviewed (and revised if necessary) if relevant control measures are revised. The view process should be carried out in consultation with workers (including contractors of the SWMS and their health and safety representatives who represented that work group at the workplace.

When the SWMS has been revised the PCBU mast ensure that advised that a revision has been made and how they can access the revised SWMS, including all persons who will need to change a work procedure or system as a rest of the review are advised of the changes in a way that will enable them to implement their duties and the involved in the work must be provided with the relevant information and instruction that will assist them to understand and implement the revised SWMS.

The SWMS must be monitored regularly for the effectiveness of ensuring hazard controls are effective in reducing the risk of incidents, keeping the workplace safe for all personnel. The person responsible for monitoring the effectiveness of the Safe Work Method Statement should employ a multi-faceted approach which includes but is not limited to:

- Spot Checks.
- 2. Consultation with workers, contractors and sub-contractors.
- 3. Internal audits on a continual basis.

An approach of continuous improvement, promptly recording inconsistencies or deficiencies, followed up by immediate corrective action and consultation with all relevant personnel ensures that the PCBU is consistently developing ever-improving systems of safe work principles.
