Safety meetings or toolbox talks will be scheduled in accordance with legislative requirements to first identify any site hazards, then to communicate those hazards and then to further take steps to either eliminate or control each hazard.

If an incident or a near miss occurs, all work must stop immediately. Depending on the severity of the incident, a meeting will be called with all workers to amend the SWMS if required. The meeting may also be an educational opportunity.

Any changes made to the SWMS after an incident or a near miss must be approved by the Person Conducting Business or Undertaking and communicated to all relevant personnel.

The SWMS must be kept and be available for inspection at least until the work is completed. Where a SWMS is revised, all versions should be kept. If a notifiable incident occurs in relation to which the SWMS relates, then the SWMS must be kept for at least two years from the occurrence of the notifiable incident.

Preparation	Lack of Training, Inadequate PPE	3H	- Conduct thorough and regular training sessions specific to climbing poles or towers for all involved personnel. - Ensure all workers have demonstrated competency in climbing techniques before allowing them to climb. - Provide detailed instruction on the correct usage and limitations of personal protective equipment (PPE). - Regularly inspect PPE for any damage or wear and replace as necessary. - Include emergency response training as part of the overall safety training program. - Ensure all training programs are compliant with Australian Workplace Health and Safety regulations. - Utilise only certified and approved climbing equipment as per Australian standards. - Require a pre-work briefing for each task, reviewing specific hazards and control measures. - Establish a mentorship system pairing inexperienced climbers with seasoned veterans. - Maintain strict adherence to industry standards for risk assessment and management. - Offer refresher courses to keep workers' skills up to date and compliant with current safety protocols. - Implement regular audits of both training effectiveness and PPE usage to identify areas for improvement. - Develop clear, comprehensive manuals and guidelines that outline every safety precaution and procedure. - Encourage an open communication policy where workers can report potential safety issues without fear of reprisal.	1L

Site Assessment	Uneven Ground, Poor Weather Conditions	3H	- Conduct a thorough pre-work site inspection to identify any uneven areas or potential trip hazards on the ground. - Develop and implement a site-specific weather monitoring plan, including protocols for pausing work during adverse weather conditions such as high winds, heavy rain, or lightning. - Provide comprehensive training for all workers on how to safely navigate uneven ground and operate in various weather conditions. - Use ground covers or matting in areas where the ground is uneven or soft to stabilise the surface and prevent slips or trips. - Clearly signpost any areas of uneven ground and set up barriers around particularly hazardous spots to prevent access by unauthorised personnel. - Ensure that all safety equipment and personal protective gear are weather-appropriate and in good condition to cope with site-specific risks.	2M

			- Establish clear communication guidelines for reporting and responding to changes in weather conditions that could impact worker safety or work quality. - Designate a competent safety officer to continually assess risk throughout the job duration, ensuring immediate response to any escalating hazard situations. - Maintain an updated emergency response plan tailored to potential hazards at the site, including specific plans for evacuation in case of sudden severe weather. - Provide regular safety briefings and updates as part of daily pre-start meetings focusing on current and anticipated weather conditions along with their potential impacts. - Equip each team member with personal weather safety kits that include items like water-resistant clothing, non-slip footwear, and head protection designed to minimise risks from both uneven grounds and adverse weather.

Equipment Check	Faulty Equipment, Tools	3H	- Conduct pre-use checks on all equipment and tools before commencement of work to identify any faults or damages. - Implement a routine maintenance schedule for all climbing equipment and tools, adhering to manufacturer guidelines and safety standards. - Provide training for workers on the correct usage and handling of specific climbing tools and equipment, focusing on safe operational procedures. - Ensure that all equipment is correctly fitted and securely fastened before use to prevent slippage or detachment while climbing. - Use only equipment and tools that meet Australian Safety Standards to ensure quality and reliability. - Establish a checkpoint system where a competent person inspects equipment after each use and before it is used by another worker. - Replace any tool or piece of equipment that shows signs of wear or damage immediately, without waiting for scheduled replacements. - Maintain clear documentation of equipment histories, including purchase dates, maintenance records, and incident logs. - Provide easy access to user manuals and safety instructions for all equipment and ensure they are kept up-to-date and in compliance with the latest safety regulations. - Equip workers with personal alert devices to report any issues with tools or equipment immediately during operations. - Limit the use of tools and equipment to those trained and authorised to handle them, reducing risks associated with unskilled use. - Perform regular audits on equipment usage practices to identify areas for improvement in safety protocols. - Foster an organisational culture that prioritises safety by encouraging open communication about equipment issues and promoting proactive reporting of potential hazards.	1L

SAFE WORK METHOD STATEMENT MONITORING AND REVIEW

The SWMS must be reviewed regularly to make sure it remains effective and must be reviewed (and revised if necessary) if relevant control measures are revised. The review process should be carried out in consultation with workers (including contractors and sub-contractors) who may be affected by the operation of the SWMS and their health and safety representatives who represented that work group at the workplace.

When the SWMS has been revised the PCBU must ensure that all persons involved with the work are advised that a revision has been made and how they can access the revised SWMS, including all persons who will need to change a work procedure or system as a result of the review are advised of the changes in a way that will enable them to implement their duties consistently with the revised SWMS. All workers that will be involved in the work must be provided with the relevant information and instruction that will assist them to understand and implement the revised SWMS.

The SWMS must be monitored regularly for the effectiveness of ensuring hazard controls are effective in reducing the risk of incidents, keeping the workplace safe for all personnel. The person responsible for monitoring the effectiveness of the Safe Work Method Statement should employ a multi-faceted approach which includes but is not limited to:

1. Spot Checks.
2. Consultation with workers, contractors and sub-contractors.
3. Internal audits on a continual basis.

An approach of continuous improvement, promptly recording inconsistencies or deficiencies, followed up by immediate corrective action and consultation with all relevant personnel ensures that the PCBU is consistently developing ever-improving systems of safe work principles.
