The SWMS must be kept and be available for inspection at least until the work is completed. Where a SWMS is revised, all versions should be kept. If a notifiable incident occurs in relation to which the SWMS relates, then the SWMS must be kept for at least two years from the occurrence of the notifiable incident.

Provide sufficient lighting across the site to enhance visibility, particularly in low-light conditions or areas prone to shadows. Maintain a clean and organised site by establishing routine housekeeping practices and responsibilities. Require the use of appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) including sturdy boots with anti-slip soles. Train workers to recognise and report hazards as soon as they are identified in their surroundings. Secure loose tools and equipment using tether systems to prevent them from becoming trip hazards. 

SAFE WORK IN 'THIS 'S' ITEM ON MONITORING AND REVIEW

The SWMS must be reviewed regularly to make sure it remain effect, and must be reviewed (and revised if necessary) if relevant control measures are revised.
